## It Just Snuck Up On Me.

## Things To Do This Month

- Ensure your hives have plenty of ventilation. You want to make sure your hives can stay as dry as possible. If you use an entrance reducer, don't reduce it down to the smallest opening, the 4"opening may work best.
- Make sure they're fed up well. Lift the hive it should be hefty. If not, it's too late for liquid feed but fondant or candy or simple dry sugar will help. Brad Raspet has a great recipe for bee candy/fondant at:

- Install mouse guards.
- Clean dead bees off the bottom board from time to time and make sure the entrances are clear.
- Clean up your equipment and sharpen your hive tools.
- Catch up on some of those magazines and find a few good bee books to read,

## 2015 Honey Report

This year I didn't get as many respondents as I did last year but but the reports I did receive sounded like most people had a pretty good year.

Last year, from those who reported how many hives they pulled honey from, we had on average 29 pounds of honey per hive.

This year we pulled approximately 31.82 pounds of honey per hive. One person reported 96 pounds from just one hive alone. Wow!

I had 11 respondents reporting on a total of 51 hives and from that they pulled 1623 pounds.
