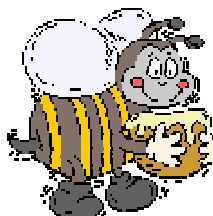

I'm hearing and seeing evidence of HIGH mites loads this fall. If you aren't checking the chances are very good you will be starting over next spring! You have to check and treat as you choose. You HAVE to! It is getting too late to feed much as the weather cools but you should be checking sugar/honey stores . You need a full box of SOMETHING for your bees to overwinter. It is also time to be brutal and decide if some hives are dinks and should just be doubled on to a strong hive. I have the hardest time with this! Make sure you have good hive ventilation. Ask what this means if you do not know. Your bees also need protection from harsh winter winds. Figure something out. Trees, hay bales, a barn, what ever. It helps to be elevated off the ground a bit.
