To introduce myself, my name is Robert Niles and in an attempt to step up and help out the Beekeeper's Association, I have volunteered to take over Ed's duties as "editor". I'm new to this sort of thing and will most likely make some spelling mistakes, grammar errors and downright "no-no"s. Please forgive me ahead of time or gently correct my blunders.

This newsletter comes to you a bit late, so I'll use it to update you on what happened at the October meeting.

Brad Raspet and Seth Smith both spoke at the October meeting. Brad introduced us to using Apiguard for Varroa mite control. Apiguard is a thymol based product made by Vita, a company in the U.K. (http://www.vita-europe.com). Thymol is found in the oil of the plant thyme, which is often used as a spice. Apiguard is considered a "soft" chemical for the control of mites.

Next Seth Smith talked about winter



preparations for your hives. Moisture control and ventilation being quite important to winter survivability. He advised that we should:

- Make sure there's plenty of honey in the hive but that there is enough space for the bees to cluster.
- Make sure we do whatever we can to keep the hives dry, including moving the hives if needed to be in a place away from damp areas, in the sun, with good ventilation.
- Make sure there is an opening at the top which will allow moisture to escape from the hive.
- Not to restrict the flow of air at the bottom of the hive.
- Feed the hives if needed. Feed fondant, sugar candy, or using the "Mountain Camp" method, simply poor a 4-5 pound bag of sugar on stop of newspaper which is spread on the top of your upper most frames or on a "candy board". The sugar absorbs moisture in the hive while feeding the bees. See <u>http://goo.gl/Zj</u>qzrw for more details on the Mountain Camp method.
