Beware Being Idle in March

Experienced members of the SVBA point out that March is not a "down" time for beekeeping here, but is in fact a critical month. Overwintering hives may have consumed food stores, and need supplemental feeding - including a supplemental pollen boost with key proteins to tide the colony over until natural pollen becomes plentiful. A warm day is an opportunity to check on the status of the colony, and you may want to have supplemental pollen patties at the ready. Like most beekeeping practices, there are some complexities associated with the type of supplement that you might use. Last month's guest speaker Dr. Jennifer Short distinguishes:

- <u>Natural pollen</u> Supports the brood.
- <u>Pollen supplements</u> (pollen patties and similar products)
 These provide an important dietary contribution to the bees at a key time, but is not used either for the brood or to produce queen jelly.
- <u>Dry pollen products</u> These do not serve as a dietary supplement for the bees, but are used to produce bee bread.
